3. Course Description

This course covers how humans learn to deal with information from the environment in everyday life. Topics include various aspects of perception, attention, memory, and language. Students will be involved in conducting experiments on cognitive functioning as part of the coursework.

4. <u>Course Learning Outcomes</u>

On completing the course, students will be able to:

- a. discuss major concepts and theories of human cognition
- b. read primary research literature in cognitive psychology in an effective manner
- c. critically evaluate existing theories and empirical findings in cognitive psychology
- d. present synthesized ideas or empirical findings in the area of cognitive psychology

5. Experiential Learning Activities

Class meetings will consist of lectures, discussions, and experiential activities. You will learn different topics in the field of cognitive psychology through group discussions, individual exploration, and compilation of results from the learning activities. You will form groups of four members for two group presentations.

On October 4 (Week 6), your group will present what you have learned from a review article. The objective of this activity is for you to have in-depth learning about one of the research topics in cognitive psychology. A list of review articles will be provided. Your group will help the whole class to learn from one of the articles on the list. Each presentation will be 12 minutes long. This presentation will contribute to 10% of the final grade.

Near the end of the semester (November 15 and 22), your group will do a second presentation. Your group will present what you have learned from a recently published research article. The objective of this activity is for you to learn from primary research findings in cognitive psychology. Your group will identify an article published on or after January 1, 2018 in one of the suggested scientific journals. Each group will need to submit the topic selection by October 25. Each presentation will be 20 minutes long. This presentation will contribute to 15% of the final grade.

<u>Online tasks.</u> You will participate in **three online tasks**. These online tasks were chosen for you to experience some of the experiments we will learn about. Data collected from some of these tasks will also be used in the Lab Report assignment. Please complete the online tasks by the specified deadlines. Each of the tasks will take 10 to 20 minutes to complete. Your completion of these online tasks will contribute to 10% of the final grade.

Lab report. You will be introduced to some classic findings in cognitive psychology in this semester. We will attempt to replicate one of these classic findings in the lab assignment. The objective of this learning activity is for you to learn from the hands-on experience of an experiment in cognitive psychology. You will be introduced to the details of this assignment in the class.

There will be two written submissions for this assignment. First, you will submit a draft of the lab report by **November 8, 2023 (3:00pm)** (10% of the final grade). The final report should NOT be longer than 2,500 words, with a Methods section no longer than 800 words, and will be due on **December 15, 2023 (5:00pm)** (25% of the final grade). Materials written beyond the word limit will not be graded.

<u>Quizzes.</u> There will be **TWO** 1-hour in-class quizzes (October 25 and November 29). In each quiz, you will need to answer **TWO long-answer questions**. The quizzes will cover materials discussed BOTH during lectures and in the assigned readings. The objective of these quizzes is NOT to test your memory, but to test your understanding and integration of the different topics in cognitive psychology. Performance in the two quizzes will contribute to the final grade with UNEVEN weights. For each student, the lower score of the two quizzes will be assigned 2/3 weight relative to the other quiz. Therefore, the higher-scoring quiz will contribute to 18% of the final grade, and the lower-scoring quiz will contribute to 12% of the final grade.

You MUST NOT share or discuss the quiz materials outside this class.

No make-up quizzes will be allowed. In case of a student missing a quiz due to medical reason (with a valid medical proof), his/her performance in the missed quiz will be predicted based on his/her performance in the other components of the course at the end of the semester. If you feel unwell on a quiz day, and if the situation allows, please email the teaching team about your anticipated absence on the quiz day **before** the scheduled quiz time.

8. Feedback Policy

Students can expect **general feedbacks** and grades on submitted assignments and quizzes within **two to three weeks**. Students can receive individual feedbacks, including those on the final quiz, through scheduling a meeting with the course instructor or tutor.
