3. Course Description

This course covers how humans learn to deal with information from the environment in everyday life. Topics include various aspects of perception, attention, memory, and language. Students will be involved in conducting experiments on cognitive functioning as part of the coursework.

On completing the course, students will be able to:

- a. discuss major concepts and theories of human cognition
- b. read primary research literature in cognitive psychology in an effective manner
- c. critically evaluate existing theories and empirical findings in cognitive psychology
- d. present synthesized ideas or empirical findings in the area of cognitive psychology

Online experiments. You will participate in two online experiments. Data collected from these lab experiments will be analyzed and reported in your Final Lab Report. Please complete the lab experiments by the specified deadline. Each of the experiments will take 10 to 20 minutes to complete. Your completion of these online tasks will contribute to 10% of the final grade.

Writing exercise. You are required to read the original articles reporting findings from experiments on which the two online experiments are based. You will need to submit your answers to the questions about these two articles. This writing exercise will be due on **February 7, 2025** (noon) and will contribute to 12% of the final grade.

Group presentation. You will have in-depth exploration on a topic of your choice in the field of cognitive psychology through doing a group presentation. Each group will consist of four members and will do a presentation near the end of the semester (**either April 2 or 9**). Your group will present what you have learned from a recently published research article. The objective of this activity is for you to learn from primary research findings in cognitive psychology. Your group will identify an article published on or after January 1, 2019 in one of the following peer-reviewed international journals:

Each group will need to submit the topic selection by **March 19**. ***In addition to presenting the published paper, each group will need to present a proposed follow-up study.*** Each presentation will be 25 minutes long. This presentation will contribute to 25% of the final grade.

Lab report. We will attempt to replicate two well-known cognitive psychology experiments in this lab assignment. The objective of this learning activity is for you to experience the process of conducting an experiment in cognitive psychology. You will be introduced to the details of this assignment in the class/tutorials.

There will be two writing assignments for the lab report. First, you will submit a draft of the lab report by **March 5, 2025** (noon) (12% of the final grade). The final report should be no longer than 2,500 words, with a Methods section no longer than 800 words, and will be due on **April 23, 2025** (noon) (25% of the final grade). Materials written beyond the word limit will not be graded.

Quizzes. There will be EIGHT short in-class quizzes, with TWO multiple-choice questions on each quiz. These quizzes will count towards 16% of the final grade.

No make-up quizzes will be allowed. In case of a student missing a quiz due to medical reasons (with a valid medical proof), his/her performance in the missed quiz will be predicted based on his/her performance in the other components of the course at the end of the semester.

7. Feedback Policy

Students can expect **general feedbacks** and grades on submitted assignments and quizzes within **two to three weeks**. Students can receive individual feedbacks, including those on the final quiz, through scheduling a meeting with the course instructor or tutor.
