An Overview of PSYC4102 Capstone Project in Neuroscience**

Course Synopsis/Description

This course comprises an independent research study in an area of neuroscience of the candidates' choice, subject to availability of supervision. Students will read within an area of study, to be agreed with their instructor, and write an extended essay or research proposal.

Assessment: 100% coursework

Prerequisite: PSYC2101

Course Objectives

1. Have students engage in individual exploration and learning within an area of neuroscience
2. Require students to meet regularly and frequently with an instructor to discuss readings
3. Students will write an extended report, such as a long essay or a research proposal

Course Learning Outcomes

On completing the course, students will be able to:

1. Read and explore within an area of neuroscience
2. Write an extended piece of work that addresses an issue in neuroscience in some depth

Course topics

The course will involve individual instruction of the student by an instructor. Student and instructor will have weekly meetings to discuss readings.

Recommended Reading List

Readings will be determined by the instructor.

Assessment method

- Research Report (100%): A report on research work performed with relevant background and reflections on learning achieved.
- Suggested word count for research report: 3,000 – 5,000 words

The Research Report

The research study can be from any areas of neuroscience including linguistics, philosophy, computer science, as well as Psychology. You may approach teaching staff in the Departments of Linguistics, Philosophy, Computer Science and Psychology Department (in the area of Neuroscience) for research supervision. You have to submit a [Working Title Confirmation form](#)

before the end of add/drop period. The Program Coordinator of Neuroscience Major should sign off on whether the supervisor and topic are appropriate.

Data Collection and Research Ethics Application

A supervisor might suggest student to collect some data. If you are required to do so and your research area is in Psychology, you should submit a research ethics application to the General Office of the Department of Psychology **within 1 month after the add/drop period**. Late submission will be penalized. Failure to submit an ethics application will lead to a failure in the course. Submission of Research Report

1. Please submit your research report to Moodle before the deadline.
 - a) Your submission must be in one single file PDF format including all the chapters.
 - b) All covering pages, pictures, tables and charts must be included in appropriate position of the file.
 - c) There is no need to submit SPSS, Excel or other files separately.
2. The deadline of submission is 23:59 on the last day of teaching in each semester.
3. The penalty for late submission is one mark for each calendar day, including Saturday, Sunday and public holidays.
4. Requests for deadline extension will not be permitted, except for medical reasons. Prior approval must be sought from the Department with supporting documents issued by a health professional and supervisor's consent.
